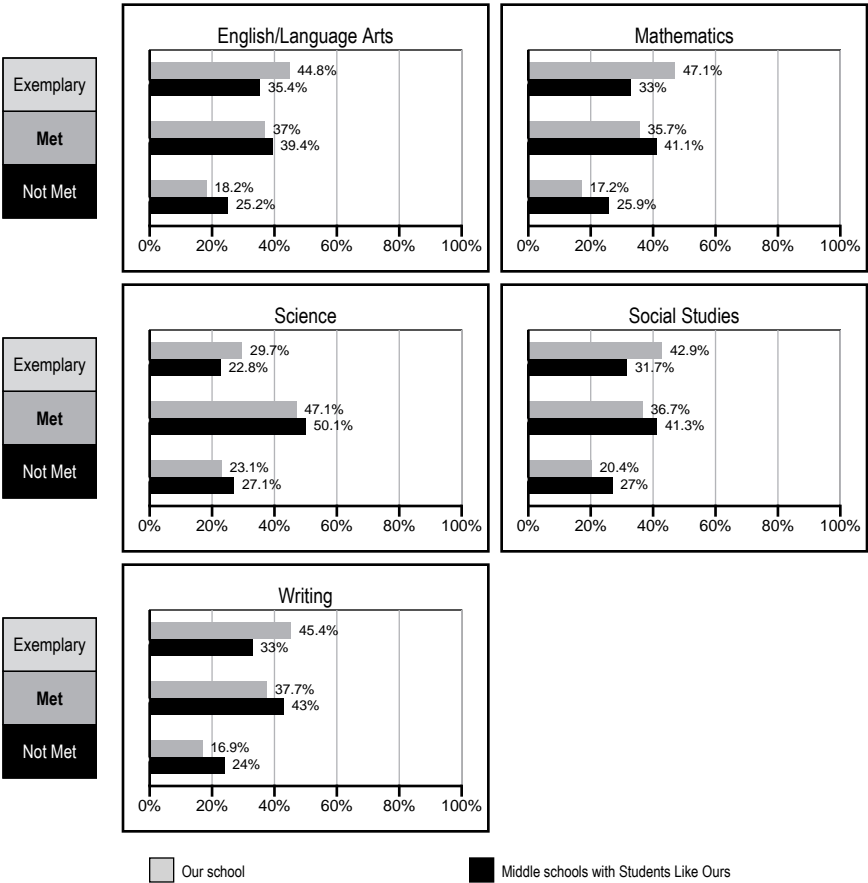

## Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Our "Eyes on the Future" theme guided our students and staff through another school year. Our continued emphasis on academics paid off. Our students and staff were blessed to receive many awards. They included the Palmetto Silver Award Winner, SC Education Department Closing the Achievement Gap Silver Award Winner, only middle school in the state to be featured by ETV's "In Our Schools" Gold and Silver program, 70 SC Junior Scholars, 30 Eagle Scholars, 1 John Hopkins Scholar, 7 Duke TIP Scholars, Best Attorney and Best Witness in district Mock Trial competition, 5 All County Chorus, 6 All County Band, 4 All County Orchestra, School Spelling Bee and Geography champions, MATHCOUNTS Competition Regional 1st place and top 10 in the state competition, 28 Math Olympiads, District Superintendent Essay Award winner, District Soil and Water Essay award winner, and the Myrtle Beach Pelicans Essay Award winner. We added mural quotes on the walls within each wing of the building to inspire our students and staff. Our PTSO has upgraded our front-yard flowerbeds and entrance area. With increased student enrollment, we have added two new portables. To enhance our security system, we have implemented two new walk-through metal detectors and an identification security check in system at our front desk. Our focus on instructional strategies included disaggregating data collected from state tests, MAP, quarterly benchmark tests, and classroom assessments. We continued with our 20/20 forty minute school-wide reading comprehension program. With this school-wide instructional time, we continue to fine tune this time for prescriptive lessons for our targeted students. We continued with our TeachFirst Professional Learning Communities instructional strategies. We continue to emphasize our Math All Stars, Math Olympiad, Math Counts, Mock Trial, Accelerated Reader, Life Skills, PSAT/SAT tutorials, and writing/reading programs. Our Math-a-thon program raised \$2200 for St. Jude's Research Hospital, \$4700 for Special Olympics, and \$1300 for "Relay for Life" cancer research. We had 40 local businesses attend our Career Day program. Our PTSO, School Improvement Council, Partners In Education, and community are second to none. Our local organizations, churches, and businesses continue to provide support and services throughout the school year. Dr. D.
